Welcome to EDUO 9138, Nourishing Responsible Digital Citizens. This course will explore digital citizenship not as a set of rules but as an organized principals-based path to turn individuals into productive and socially responsible lifetime digital citizens. Using the text, “Digital Citizenship in Schools, 3rd Edition 2015 by Mike Ribble, you will learn how to apply a framework for asking what students should be doing with respect to technology so they can become productive and responsible users of digital technologies.

Course Objectives:

1. In this course you will have opportunity to learn:
 - a. The nine elements of digital citizenship and how to incorporate them in the classroom
 - b. Professional development activities to instill citizenship concepts
 - c. Changes to the technology landscape, new tools and devices
 - d. Lesson plans, correlated to ISTE Standards, for teaching different aspects of digital citizenship

Getting Started:

Introduction

Just exactly what is a good Digital Citizen? Before answering this question, a base for what makes good citizen must be established. There are numerous definitions for good citizenship. Most involve being aware of and involved in the greater interest and needs of people around us, both local and global. It more than just being nice, being moral and following laws although those are important pieces.

Students today have always had technology in their lives, so many teachers assume their students are competent tech users – more competent, in fact, than themselves. In reality, not all students are as tech savvy as teachers might assume, and not all teachers are as incompetent as they fear. Even when students are comfortable using technology, they may not be using it appropriately. Likewise, educators of all skill levels may not understand how to use technology effectively. Both students and teachers need to become members of a digital citizenry.

Assignments

Assignment 1: Good Citizens, Ethical and Moral Behaviors

Objective: Understanding the benefits of good citizens to society.

There are 3 parts to this assignment.

This assignment looks at defining good citizens and the necessity for society to embrace good citizenship. We hear too frequently of inappropriate technology use by students and adults. Are these occurrences related to inappropriate social behaviors? Are they carried out as innocent, mischievous behavior or are there deeper irresponsible and unethical behaviors involved?

Part A - Behaviors: Define in individual paragraphs terms a., b. and c.

- a. Good Citizenship
- b. Ethical versus Moral Behavior
- c. Digital Ethics and Morals

Assignment 2: Nine Elements of Digital Citizenship

Objective: Learning and Understanding the Nine Elements of Digital Citizenship
